Executive summary:

The agenda for the meeting proposed sharing the results and experiences of the First Phase of Network-project (2011-2013) with colleagues at the CoE; initiate exchanges and collaboration with the Council of Europe's Roma-related actions and discuss the involvement of the Network during the Second Phase (2013-2015) in the work of the CoE.

The two sessions of the day (morning/afternoon) offered opportunities to discuss these issues with twelve colleagues from different divisions of the CoE, among them Mr Jeroen Schokkenbroek, Special Representative of the Secretary General for Roma Issues and Mr Sixto Molina, Head of the Support Team for Roma Issues, Mr Huber Denis, Head of the Alliance of Cities and Regions for Roma Inclusion Taskforce, members of the Roma Support Group and the Alliance Task Force and others (see detailed report). During the discussions concrete opportunities for collaboration have been identified and exact ways of involvement proposed for the Network members in supporting the Council of Europe's Roma-related actions (see action plan).

Detailed report:

The meeting lasted one day. The morning section was composed by two series of meetings (9:30-11:30 and 11:30-12:30); the afternoon comprised of a single section (14:00-16:00) and a concluding discussion.

The early morning session has been reserved to the discussion with Ms Jeroen Schokkenbroek and Mr Sixto Molina. Ms Kathrin Merkle opened the discussions and the session has been chaired by Dr Elisabeth Tauber. The representatives of the Network presented a brief discussion paper (see annexed) which emphasised that following the establishment and consolidation of the **European Academic Network on Romani Studies** a broad range of experts can be accessed by the CoE by appealing to the network membership.

Network members are widely distributed regionally, are highly qualified and specialised in various academic disciplines, represent different generations, field experience, language competencies, and the network also has a balanced gender composition. In this way the Network represents a great resource for the CoE and other bodies in their efforts to improve their Roma-related activities and policies, to develop a new understanding of Roma society and its position within the majority society, and to elaborate and implement more efficient policies. The network is using the Procedure for soliciting Network expertise on policy reports and other documents adopted by the Scientific Committee in order to gather comments and access expertise in a transparent and efficient way.

The Network is not an advocacy organisation and does not seek to represent and speak for Roma communities. It is committed to maintain high professional standards and an academic ethos in vetting its members and their contributions in order to provide academic value that is of a different quality than advocacy oriented 'NGO-scholarship'. In the spirit of academic principles, the Network members are committed to the dialog practices and peer-review of the work-in-progress documents. This practice is also offered to the CoE when seeking to evaluate and improve proposals, policy reports or other kind of documents. In order to make use of the potentials inherent in the Network it is necessary to cooperate closely, so the representatives of the Network proposed to regard truly the network as a project of the CoE, provide the network via the Secretary with information and activity calendars, involve the network more often in the work of the colleagues at the CoE.

During the morning session representatives of the Network engaged in a dialog with the Special Representative of the Secretary General for Roma Issues and the head of the Support Team (see details <u>http://hub.coe.int/web/coe-portal/roma_srsg-support-team</u>). Ms Jeroen Schokkenbroek and Mr Sixto Molina provided the Network with a report overweening the CoE activities on Roma issues (see attached). Several concrete proposals have been made regarding the future collaboration with the projects based at the CoE: 1) the Network members have been invited to visit the Database of Policies and Good Practices (http://goodpracticeroma.ppa.coe.int) managed by Mr Michael Guet and to suggest improvements and completions to the details accessible, it is also possible to expand the list of experts involved in the evaluation and validation of the policies included into the database; 2) it has been suggested to identify and implement ways of participation of the Network in the operations of the CAHROM - the Ad hoc Committee of Experts on Roma Issues (see http://hub.coe.int/web/coe-portal/cahrom1) for example offer external review and commentary on the thematic reports or suggest topics for the further reports; 3) the personal involvement of some of the network members in the thematic visits of the CAHROM; 4) to organise targeted meetings in the future with the SGSR, the Support Team etc. The details for these meetings need to be discussed and decided jointly by the SGSR team and the SC.

The continued morning session comprised meetings with Ms Aurora Ailincai, manager of the Educational programs for Roma (http://www.coe.int/t/dg4/education/roma/default_en.asp) and the ROMED project (http://coe-romed.org/); Ms Irene Weidmann, manager of the Art Exhibitions programs and projects on Roma culture, Mr Robert Rustem and Ms Clémentine Trolong-Bailly, from the secretariat of the European Roma and Travellers Forum (http://www.ertf.org/). This session has been chaired by Professor Yaron Matras. The discussions concluded in a number of concrete proposals: 1) Ms Aurora Ailincai will analyse the possibility and necessity to complement the existing Factsheets on Roma (see http://romafacts.uni-graz.at/) the Network can contribute to expand the available expertise; 2) the resources for teaching about Genocide of the Roma (http://www.romagenocide.org) prepared in collaboration by the Council of Europe and OSCE/ODIHR should be reviewed, the available materials updated, and the members of the Network can be involved in these activities; 3) Ms Irene Weidmann shared the results of the preparation phase of the project 'Cultural Resources for Roma inclusion'. During this phase five feasibility studies have been developed. Ms Weidmann proposed to consult members of the Network as an advisors during the implementation phase starting in 2014 of the 'Cultural Resources for Roma inclusion' project (http://www.coe.int/t/dg4/cultureheritage/culture/romainclusion/Default_en.asp); 4) Mr Robert Rustem and Ms Clémentine Trolong-Bailly will share with the Network and ask for commentaries on the documents and initiatives of the ERTF: a) the Charter on the Rights of the Roma; b) a Toolkit on combating anti-Gypsyism; c) members of the Network to support the preparation of a volume commemorating the Roma Genocide and prepare a day for commemorating the victims; d) assist the ERTF with advice and finding expert for preparing a study on the economic costs of segregated education of the Roma.

The discussions continued after the lunch-break. Mr Ciprian Necula chaired the afternoon session. The **European Alliance of Cities and Regions for Roma Inclusion** has been represented by Mr Denis Huber, Head of the Alliance Taskforce, Ms Ana Rozanova, programme manager of the Alliance, and Mr Nikolai Atefie, member of the Alliance Taskforce. Dr Carole Reich represented the programs on **Remembrance of the Holocaust and Prevention of Crimes against Humanity**, and Ms Eleni Tsetsekou, the **Dosta! Campaign**, the **Roma women** projects, and the **lawyers' training**.

The Alliance is an initiative of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities, in cooperation with the Special Representative of the Secretary General for Roma Issues and its aim is to develop peer-topeer relations between the local authorities, and to share knowledge and positive practices between the stakeholders (see: <u>http://www.coe.int/t/congress/sessions/alliance/default_en.asp</u> also its website <u>http://www.roma-alliance.org/</u>). In the near future the Alliance will implement the ROMACT Program involving three main partners: The MERI - Mayors Making the Most of EU Funds for Roma Inclusion Network hosted by the Open Society Fundation (<u>http://www.logincee.org/newsitem/6052</u>), the ROMED (<u>http://coe-romed.org/</u>) and the Alliance (<u>http://www.roma-alliance.org/</u>).

Dr Carole Reich presented the CoE engagement in the domain of **Remembrance of the Holocaust**. The CoE is a permanent observer in the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) and takes part in their regular work. With the help of scientists and artists the CoE is developing educational/pedagogical materials for teachers in order to raise the awareness on the Holocaust (an example of a recent publication is Les victimes du nazisme. Destins spécifiques, by Régis Schlagdenhauffen, Strasbourg, 2012; Editions du Conseil de l'Europe – illustrated by Francine Mayran).

Ms Eleni Tsetsekou presented briefly the Dosta! - Campaign and asked for feed-back from the Network members on the toolkit developed (http://www.coe.int/t/dg3/romatravellers/dosta en.asp). There was a discussion regarding the target audience of such campaigns and the calibration of the tools to the groups targeted. The representatives of the networks suggested that even if Dosta! - is well suitable for the general public, for schools and media, it might be useful to develop additional tools for addressing local authorities and other stakeholders. Ms Eleni Tsetsekou also spoke about the 4th International Roma Women's Conference which will be organised in Helsinki, Finland in the autumn of 2013 (http://hub.coe.int/roma-women). The following proposals have been made during the discussions: 1) the RAN Network members should be involved in the process of building up the European Alliance of Cities and Regions for Roma Inclusion by calling upon their expertise, and they could also facilitate contact between the local authorities and research institutes/universities where they are based; 2) members of the Network could also identify further local authorities interested in joining the Alliance and facilitate contacts; 3) Dr Carole Reich recommended for the Network to get in contact with the IHRA Working Group on the Genocide of the Roma chaired by Ms Karen Polak, (http://www.holocaustremembrance.com/joint-subcommittees); 4) the Network members specialised in the History of the Holocaust, remembrance, and connected issues could review and comment on the materials developed and published by the CoE; 5) network members could comment on the Dosta! toolkit and identify experts interested in anti-discrimination campaigns, and in issues connected to awareness raising; 6) the Network could identify and/or facilitate contact with potential participants of the 4th Congress of the Roma Women.

Annex:

Draft discussion points for the restricted meeting of the Scientific Committee for consultation on Council of Europe Roma-related actions Strasbourg, 22 May 2013

1. Where the Network can add value:

- Deliver a broader range of expertise than that available so far to the CoE in respect of academic discipline, regional expertise, gender, age, and background. So far CoE has relied on weak academic expertise of insignificant discipline-based reputation and little field experience, limited to few countries of origin and similar generation
- Broader access to a large resources, ensuring transparency in soliciting expertise, providing a more effective service of better ' value'
- Allowing a differentiated and specialised approach to the overall 'vision' on Roma and opportunities to deal with diversity within the CoE umbrella programme on Roma/ and to rely on new understandings of Roma society and its position within majority society
- The network can help we can help improve the quality of CoE activities, publications and information on Roma by ensuring a solid basic academic basis through a system of peer review (peer review college), where reviews are open to public scrutiny
- We aim to provide easy access to reliable information (e.g. through database of experts and expertise reports and public and open soliciting of expertise), offering a unique resource that is not available elsewhere

2. Our vision for cooperation:

- Mutual reporting: CoE should report on its activities to the network and advertise how our members can contribute, e.g. comment on draft papers and project proposals (e.g. history projects, fact sheets, mediator programme, etc in which CoE has obvious interest but lacks broad expertise).
- Avoid appointing one individual to write the history of Roma, or to standardise the Romani language, etc; the network can provide reviews and opinions and thus a service giving more resources to choose from and greater transparency
- Exchange of information and meeting attendance with MG-S-ROM
- ERTF is invited to solicit the network's expertise, an opportunity to form new partnerships between Romani NGOs and academics, and for NGOs to draw on the service of academics
- Regard the network as a CoE project, provide us with an activity calendar, involve us more in activity planning; begin by listing information that CoE can supply or involve us in and mapping CoE activities on Roma

• Offer expertise to specialised CoE activities such as language charter, human rights commissioner, national minorities, regions and local authorities etc; break through the divisions within CoE rather than 'belong' to one single domain/directorate

3. Maintaining clear boundaries and definitions

- The network is not an advocacy organisation, it does not have a mandate to, and does not seek to, represent or speak for Roma communities
- There is no 'objective consensus' on Roma issues, and the network does not pretend to speak with a single uniform voice; rather, it provides access to a range of viewpoints and diverse forms of expertise
- The network maintains high professional standards and an academic ethos in vetting its members and their contributions; it provides academic value that is of a different quality than advocacy oriented 'NGO-scholarship'
